The proposal would increase by 4,000 the number of SIVs available to certain Afghans who were employed by or on behalf of the U.S. government or the International Security Assistance Force (or any successor name for such Force) at some point since 2001. (Additional SIVs, not subject to limitation, are available to certain relatives of those employees who themselves received SIVs.) Like refugees (but unlike most other categories of aliens), Afghan special immigrants are eligible for federal benefits if they meet the other eligibility standards for those programs. CBO uses a variety of administrative and survey data to estimate Afghan special immigrants' usage rates and per-capita costs for federal-benefit programs.
