**A bill to direct the Secretary of the Interior to proclaim as reservation  
for the benefit of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians  
a parcel of land now held in trust by the  
United States for that Indian tribe**

*As ordered reported by the Committee on Natural Resources on July 18, 2007*

H.R. 2120 would direct the Secretary of the Interior to proclaim as reservation a parcel of land now held in trust by the United States for the benefit of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians. Under the bill, the land would be designated as reservation primarily for gaming activities. Based on information from the Bureau of Indian Affairs, CBO estimates that implementing this bill would have no significant effect on the federal budget.

H.R. 2120 contains no intergovernmental or private-sector mandates as defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act and would impose no costs on state, local, or tribal governments.
