<sup>1.</sup> Section 632 of the lke Skelton National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2011 (Public Law 111-383), requires the Department of Defense to make retirement payments on the first of each month. It is not yet clear how the Department will choose to interpret and implement this language if the first of the month falls on a weekend or holiday. For it's baseline, CBO assumes that in those instances where the first of the month falls on a weekend or holiday, DoD will make the payments on the last business day preceding the first of the month. This will result in additional paydays in fiscal years 2011, 2016, and 2017.
