Metacomet-Monadnock-Mattabesett Trail Study Act of 2001

As ordered reported by the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources on July 31, 2002

H.R. 1814 would amend the National Trails System Act to add a network of trails in the northeastern United States to the list of routes to be studied for possible inclusion in the National Trails System. The Secretary of the Interior would have two years to conduct a study of the 180-mile Metacomet-Monadnock-Mattabesett Trail system in Massachusetts and Connecticut.

Based on information provided by the National Park Service and assuming appropriation of the necessary amount, CBO estimates that it would cost the federal government \$270,000 over the next two years to conduct the required study and report to the Congress on its findings. H.R. 1814 would not affect direct spending or receipts; therefore, pay-as-you-go procedures would not apply. The legislation contains no intergovernmental or private-sector mandates as defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act and would impose no costs on state, local, or tribal governments.

On September 21, 2001, CBO transmitted a cost estimate for H.R. 1814 as ordered reported by the House Committee on Resources on September 12, 2001. The two versions of the legislation are identical, as are the cost estimates.
