H.R. 643 Sugar Loaf Fire Protection District Land Exchange Act

As ordered reported by the House Committee on Natural Resources on June 15, 2011

H.R. 643 would authorize the exchange of approximately five acres of federal land for a similar amount of acreage owned by the Sugar Loaf Fire Protection District of Boulder, Colorado. Based on information provided by the Forest Service, which administers the federal land to be conveyed, CBO estimates that implementing the bill would have no impact on discretionary spending. Any administrative costs related to the exchange would be paid by the Sugar Loaf Fire Protection District.

Enacting H.R. 643 could increase offsetting receipts (a credit against direct spending); therefore, pay-as-you-go procedures apply. Because the nonfederal lands have a lower value than the Forest Service lands that would be conveyed, CBO expects that the Sugar Loaf Fire Protection District would provide a cash payment to the agency equal to the difference in values between the two parcels of land. Based on information from the Forest Service, CBO estimates that such a payment would be less than \$50,000. Proceeds from the payment would be deposited in the United States Treasury.

H.R. 643 contains no intergovernmental or private-sector mandates as defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act and would impose no costs on state, local, or tribal governments. The land conveyance authorized in the bill would benefit the fire protection district. Any costs to the district would be incurred voluntarily.
