H.R. 5640 **Electricity Storage Innovation Act**

*As passed by the U.S. House of Representatives
on July 11, 2016*

H.R. 5640 would authorize the appropriation of \$150 million annually over the 2017-2020 period for the Department of Energy to perform basic research on electric energy storage. Assuming appropriation of the authorized amounts, CBO estimates that implementing H.R. 5640 would cost \$579 million over the 2017-2021 period.

Pay-as-you-go procedures do not apply to this legislation because enacting it would not affect direct spending or revenues. CBO estimates that enacting H.R. 5640 would not increase net direct spending or on-budget deficits in any of the four consecutive 10-year periods beginning in 2027.

H.R. 5640 contains no intergovernmental or private-sector mandates as defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act (UMRA) and would impose no costs on state, local, or tribal governments.

ESTIMATED COST TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

The estimated budgetary impact of H.R. 5640 is shown in the following table. The costs of this legislation fall within budget function 250 (general science, space, technology).

BASIS OF ESTIMATE

For this estimate, CBO assumes that H.R. 5640 will be enacted near the end of fiscal year 2016, that the specified amounts will be appropriated in each year starting in 2017, and that outlays will follow historical spending patterns for comparable programs for basic energy research run by the Department of Energy.

INCREASE IN LONG-TERM DEFICIT AND DIRECT SPENDING

CBO estimates that enacting H.R. 5640 would not increase net direct spending or on-budget deficits in any of the four consecutive 10-year periods beginning in 2027.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AND PRIVATE-SECTOR IMPACT

H.R. 5640 contains no intergovernmental or private-sector mandates as defined in UMRA and would impose no costs on state, local, or tribal governments.
