Expanding Contracting Opportunities for Small Businesses Act of 2018

As reported by the House Committee on Small Business on September 12, 2018

H.R. 6369 would raise the threshold amount that federal contracting officers may award in sole-source contracts to certain types of small businesses. In addition, until the Small Business Administration (SBA) develops a program to determine small businesses' eligibility to receive such contracts, the SBA would need to certify businesses individually upon request from a federal contracting officer. H.R. 6369 also would require the Government Accountability Office (GAO) to evaluate and report to the Congress on federal policies and practices regarding classifying and awarding sole-source contracts.

Using information from the SBA, CBO estimates that developing the certification program would cost less than \$500,000—the agency is already developing a similar program. Based on the costs of similar tasks, CBO estimates that it would cost GAO less than \$500,000 to complete the required evaluation and report. Such spending would be subject to the availability of appropriated funds.

Enacting H.R. 6369 would not affect direct spending or revenues; therefore, pay-as-you-go procedures do not apply.

CBO estimates that enacting H.R. 6369 would not increase net direct spending or on-budget deficits in any of the four consecutive 10-year periods beginning in 2029.

H.R. 6369 contains no intergovernmental or private-sector mandates as defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act.
