	H.R. 7 would prohibit the use of federal funds, except in certain cases, to provide abortion services and would prohibit the federal government from offering subsidies for health insurance that covers those services. The bill also would prohibit federal health care facilities or federal employees from providing abortion services.

	H.R. 21 would prohibit drawdowns and sales from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve, except during severe interruptions of the energy supply, unless the Department of Energy (DOE) developed a plan to increase the share of federal land that is leased for oil and gas production. The bill would direct DOE to develop such a plan in consultation with the Departments of Agriculture, Defense, and the Interior. CBO anticipates that, over the 2023-2033 period, no drawdowns under current law would be subject to the bill's provisions.

	H.R. 28 would require the National Instant Criminal Background Check system to notify Immigration and Customs Enforcement and any relevant state and local law enforcement agencies when anyone who is unlawfully present in the United States has tried to obtain a firearm.

	H.R. 29 would require the Department of Homeland Security to deny entry to any alien arriving at the U.S. border without a visa or other valid entry document during a period in which the department cannot detain such people or return them—for the duration of their immigration proceedings—to the adjacent country from which they arrived.									

CBO has determined that none of the listed bills would increase direct spending, on net, by more than \$2.5 billion in any of the four consecutive 10-year periods beginning in 2034.

CBO has determined that none of the listed bills would increase on-budget deficits by more than \$5 billion in any of the four consecutive 10-year periods beginning in 2034.

On January 10, 2023, CBO transmitted estimated budgetary effects and mandates information for three bills referred to in H. Res. 5: [H.R. 22](#), the Protecting America's Strategic Petroleum Reserve From China Act; [H.R. 26](#), the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act; and [H.R. 27](#), the Prosecutors Need to Prosecute Act. Those bills were considered by the House during the week of January 9, 2023.
