<p>H.R. 185 would prohibit federal funds from being used to enforce the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's COVID-19 vaccination requirement for foreign travelers arriving at U.S. airports. CBO estimates that the bill would increase collections of certain customs fees, some categorized as offsetting receipts and others categorized as revenues that can be spent without further appropriation. However, CBO estimates that the bill's net budgetary effects would be insignificant.</p>
