On September 20, 2023, the House Committee on Oversight and Accountability ordered reported the following four bills that would name different post offices.

- H.R. 599, a bill to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 3500 West 6th Street, Suite 103 in Los Angeles, California, as the “Dosan Ahn Chang Ho Post Office,”
- H.R. 3865, a bill to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 101 South 8th Street in Lebanon, Pennsylvania, as the “Lieutenant William D. Lebo Post Office Building,”
- H.R. 3947, a bill to designate the facility of the United State Postal Service located at 859 North State Road 21 in Melrose, Florida, as the “Pamela Jane Rock Post Office Building,” and
- H.R. 5034, a bill to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 2119 Market Square in Christiansted, St. Croix, United States Virgin Islands, as the “Lieutenant General Samuel E. Ebbesen Post Office.”
