The table above applies to each bill separately, as described below; * = between zero and \$500,000.

On January 25, 2024, the Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works reported the following three bills that would name different federal facilities:

- S. 3412, the Reuben E. Lawson Federal Building Act of 2023;
- S. 3570, a bill to designate the United States courthouse located at 500 West Pike Street in Clarksburg, West Virginia, as the "Irene M. Keeley United States Courthouse," and for other purposes; and
- S. 3577, a bill to designate the Federal building located at 300 E. 3rd Street in North Platte, Nebraska, as the "Virginia Smith Federal Building," and for other purposes.

CBO estimates that naming those facilities would have no significant cost. Any spending would be subject to the availability of appropriated funds.
