S. 3775 would authorize the appropriation of \$33 million each year from 2025 through 2029 for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to provide grants to support public health awareness and evidence-based practices related to Alzheimer’s disease and related dementias. In 2024, CDC allocated \$40 million for that purpose.

Assuming appropriation of the authorized amounts and using historical spending patterns for those activities, CBO estimates that implementing S. 3775 would cost \$139 million over the 2024-2029 period and \$26 million after 2029.

The costs of the legislation, detailed in Table 1, fall within budget function 550 (health).
